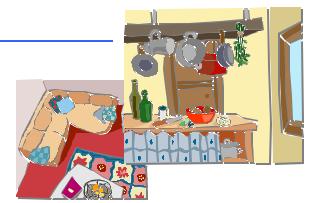

BEFORE SHOWING

- 1. Discuss the duties of an interior designer.
- 2. Locate several pictures from magazines illustrating different room designs.
 - a. Discuss how someone chose the colors, furniture, fixtures or fabrics for the room.
 - b. Discuss what skills were needed to make a bare room into the one shown in the picture.



AFTER SHOWING

Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. What are the most important skills needed to be a successful interior designer?
- 2. Name some of the high school courses recommended for people who would like to become interior designers.
- 3. The video states that one of the misconceptions about interior designers is that they "only mix colors."
- 4. Explain why an interior designer needs each of the following skills:
 - a. client needs assessment
 - b. creativity
 - c. communication
 - d. time management
 - e. cost estimation
 - f. computer use
- 5. List the positives and negatives associated with an internship or working for an interior design firm before starting your own business.
- 6. What challenges could a deaf person face in this particular field? How could those challenges be met?
- 7. What is the possible future uses of computers in the design field?
- 8. Describe a typical day for an interior designer.

Applications and Activities

- 1. List the different ways an interior designer can get ideas (i.e., magazines, billboards, others).
- 2. Gather pictures to compare the different facets of design:
 - a. residential
 - b. commercial
 - c. industrial
 - d. product
- 3. Invite an interior designer to speak to the class or visit an interior design firm.
- 4. Use the Internet to research the interior design programs at colleges or universities. Note tuition costs, course and degree requirements, and other factors.
- 5. Design a room for a house or a business.



- 6. Set up a demonstration of the CAD computer program and discuss its usefulness in interior design.
- 7. Write to the American Society for Interior Designers, 1430 Broadway, New York, New York, 10018 for more information on interior design.
- 8. Discuss the implications of each of the following statements made in the video:
 - a. Dream about what you'd like to do tomorrow. There's a better chance you'll get it all done.
 - b. Students who have goals for the future do get better grades.

 - d. Keep your eye on the goal.
