What is respect? How can we show it? Explores the concept, stressing the Golden Rule, "Treat others the way you want to be treated." Shows how to put respect into action at home, at school, and in the community.



ACADEMIC STANDARDS

Subject Area: Working With Others

- Standard: Contributes to the overall effort of a group
 - Benchmark: Demonstrates respect for others in the group

INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS

- 1. To define respect.
- 2. To dramatize disrespectful and respectful behaviors.
- 3. To emphasize appropriate respectful actions.

BEFORE SHOWING

Allow 45 minutes to an hour of class time for the viewing of the video, discussion and activity time. The running time of the video is approximately 28 minutes. Discussion and activity time should last 25 to 30 minutes. We suggest using the discussion section immediately following the viewing of the video. The activities are optional, but offer a fun and entertaining way to reinforce the character facts the students have just learned. (Choose the most appropriate activity for your age class.)

AFTER SHOWING

Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. What does integrity mean?
- 2. What does it mean to be a person of integrity?
- 3. Can anyone be a person of integrity?
- 4. Who can turn you into a person of integrity?
- 5. Does integrity matter? Why?
- 6. Where does integrity matter?
- 7. What is respect for others?

- 8. Why should you show respect for others?
- 9. Where should you be respectful?
- 10. What is a good way to remember how to show respect for others?
- 11. What does the Golden Rule say?
- 12. How can you show respect at home? Give examples.
- 13. How can you show respect at school? Give examples.
- 14. How can you show respect in the community? Give examples.

Applications and Activities

- 1. Instruct your students to think of a situation at home, school or in the community where they should show respect. Have them draw the scene. As time permits, ask certain students to describe the "What", "Why" and "How" of their respectful scenarios.
- 2. Rewind Guy and Policé Man Skit: (You'll need a TV remote control as a prop.) Divide the students in your class into two groups. One person in each group will be the Rewind Guy (RG) and another will be chosen to be Policé Man (PM). Have each group think of a scenario about honesty not used in the video. Then have them act out their scenario first by doing things the "wrong way." After they have done this, the PM contacts RG through whatever communication mode the students dream up. Then RG uses his remote control to freeze the situation. (The characters should actually freeze in place and stay that way until RG "rewinds" them.) Then the RG or other team member will briefly discuss what the "characters" did "wrong" in the scenario. Next the RG will "rewind" the characters back to where they started to reenact the situation doing things the "right way." After they are finished with the scene, the RG and PM will discuss why acting out the scene the "right way" showed honesty.

SUMMARY

R-E-S-P-E-C-T. Seven simple letters to spell one complicated work. But, is it really so complicated after all? A part of the Integrity Matters series, the video explores the concept of respect in great detail, including the meaning of respect, why it is important to be respectful, and how to put respect into action at home, at school, and in the community. As the video progresses, the Golden Rule is introduced and repeated throughout, teaching the simplest way to remember how to show respect.
