# **DESCRIPTION**

Several short vignettes demonstrate safety tips that help children protect themselves when on the Internet and on the streets. Stresses open communication with parents about Internet use, and using neighbors and code words as extra precautions when outside the home.

- 2. Compare and contrast how student's parents have taught them to deal with these situations.

- 1. Why is it important to learn about Internet and street safety situations and tips?
- 2. Do you know anyone who has ever been confronted with a dangerous situation? How did they deal with it?
- 3. How should safety tips be modified for a child or parent who is deaf or hard of hearing?

# **Applications and Activities**

- 1. Prepare a bulletin board with these and other safety tips to help protect others in your school.
- 2. Utilizing the Internet, research and discuss actual cases that have changed child safety standards in the United States.
- 3. Create a secret code word for your family. Make sure to share it with your siblings and discuss with your family when and why you should have a secret code word.
