

#9923 THE TEEN FILES FLIPPED: STUDENT/TEACHER

AIMS MULTIMEDIA, 2002 Grade Level: 9-12 21 mins.

DESCRIPTION

Cameron, the class clown, and Miss A., his Spanish teacher, get "flipped" for 24 hours. Miss A. deals with peer and teacher pressures, tardiness, detention, and athome chores. Cameron copes with meetings, prep time, classroom discipline, parent conferences, being supervised, paying bills, and grading papers. Each acknowledges the need for compassion, communication, and understanding for the other. NOTE: Profanity in the audio has been censored.

INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS

- 1. To show the similarities between people of different roles and ages.
- 2. To encourage the development of a perspective that respects the dignity and worth of people of different roles and ages.
- 3. To depict the use of conflict resolution skills.
- 4. To illustrate how understanding can replace conflict.



BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In this video from the explosive, award-winning series called *The Teen Files Flipped*, Cameron, a high school class clown, and Miss A. (Andrea), a high school Spanish teacher, trade places for a day. While Miss A. struggles with the performance pressure and time demands placed on high school students, Cameron finds himself confronted with bored, out-of-control kids, and superiors who want to see results.

BEFORE SHOWING

- 1. Discuss the roles and responsibilities of teachers. Describe stereotypes or misconceptions about teachers. Do teachers have a difficult job? Why or why not?
- 2. Discuss whether or not teachers understand the pressures that students encounter each day. Do students understand the pressures that teachers face each day? Why or why not?
- 3. Why do some students act like class clowns? What impact does this have on the class and the teacher?



AFTER SHOWING

Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. Describe Cameron's attitude and behavior at the beginning of the video. What is his opinion of Miss A. and teaching in general?
- 2. Why is Miss A. frustrated with Cameron? Why does Miss A. believe that Cameron acts like a class clown? What other reasons may Cameron have for acting like a class clown?
- 3. At the start of the "flip" day, how do Cameron and Miss A. feel about their roles for the day? How would you feel in this situation?
- 4. Describe the experiences throughout the day that cause Miss A. to be uncomfortable. Which part of the day does she enjoy and why?
- 5. Why is someone from the district office following Cameron for the day? Discuss whether or not this is a real experience for a teacher.

- 6. What happens when Cameron teaches his first class? Discuss whether or not this is a true teaching experience. How do the students do on the test, and what is Cameron's concern?
- 7. Describe what happens when Cameron subs for another Spanish teacher's class.
- 8. What do Cameron and Miss A. discover when they go home at the end of the day? How do they feel about paying bills and doing chores?
- 9. Describe what Cameron and Miss A. learn from their experiences on their flip day. Discuss the impact of this day on their future attitudes and behaviors.

Applications and Activities

- 1. Create a page for the school's Web site featuring four to six different teachers each month. Write the articles based on interviews with the teachers.
- 2. Research teaching in different countries. Include educational requirements, salary, roles, responsibilities, and the respect of educators. Compare and contrast the findings.
- 3. Plan and hold an appreciation party for the teachers at the school.
- 4. Research various careers, including teaching. Consider educational requirements, responsibilities, salary, and benefits. Compare and contrast the findings.
- 5. Role-play various teacher and student scenarios.
- 6. Invite a professor from a college of education to present to the class reasons why people enter the teaching profession and what the college program includes.
- 7. Visit an elementary school weekly or bimonthly. Pair up with younger students for tutoring or other educational interaction. Keep a journal of the experiences.
- 8. Create a coupon book for a teacher. Brainstorm coupon ideas. Decorate the coupon books and present to a teacher. Possible coupon ideas include:
 - a. Clean desktops.
 - b. Correct papers.
 - c. Empty the trash.
 - d. Care for classroom plants.
 - e. Clean the chalkboards or whiteboards.
 - f. Pass out papers.
 - g. Work on bulletin boards.
 - h. Straighten and organize the classroom bookshelves.
