DESCRIPTION

Journeys through Southeast Asia, providing a quick overview of Thailand, Burma (Myanmar), Laos, Cambodia, Vietnam, Singapore; and Java, Bali; and Borneo, islands of Indonesia. Briefly describes capitals, markets, religion, tourist sites, geography, and the people. Introduces the area to potential travelers.

INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS

- 1. To introduce the geography, population, culture, religion and history of the following Southeast Asian countries: Thailand, Burma, Laos, Cambodia, Vietnam, Singapore and Indonesia.
- 2. To encourage travel to Southeast Asia.
- 3. To depict the characteristics of various cities within Southeast Asia.

 - d. How were the ruins of Angkor lost for hundreds of years?
