

## NATIONAL POLITICS: THE COLD WAR

Grade Levels: 7-12 25 minutes AIMS MULTIMEDIA 1996 1 Instructional Graphic Enclosed

## **DESCRIPTION**

Starting with Truman's presidency after the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt, this four-part interactive production explores American politics after World War II to 1961. Historic footage enhances coverage of Eisenhower's military success and presidency, John F. Kennedy's political career, and Nixon's tenure as vice-president and unsuccessful run for president. Pretests encourage viewers to listen carefully and check their answers.

#### **ACADEMIC STANDARDS**

### Subject Area: Historical Understanding

- Standard: Understands the historical perspective
  - Benchmark: Analyzes the values held by specific people who influenced history and the role their values played in influencing history
  - Benchmark: Analyzes the influence specific ideas and beliefs had on a period of history

- Standard: Understands how post-World War II reconstruction occurred, new international power relations took shape, and colonial empires broke up
  - Benchmark: Understands the impact of relations between the United States and the Soviet Union during the Cold War

## **INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS**

- To explore the roles of Harry S. Truman, Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy and Richard Nixon in the Cold War.
- 2. To provide basic facts about the early years of the Cold War.
- 3. To stimulate interest in the Cold War.

## **BEFORE SHOWING**

- 1. Prepare students for their role in playing a history game.
  - a. Determine if students will play on an individual or team basis.
  - b. Provide each student/team with a "History Game Worksheet." (See INSTRUCTIONAL GRAPHICS.)
  - c. Begin the video and allow the program to play until the narrator completes question #3. Stop the tape each time the star symbol (accompanied by an audible beep) appears on the screen. This will occur after every third question. Allow the student/team time to answer the three questions before continuing. In the segment following the three questions, the video presents historical footage to provide the answers for each question.
  - d. After each set there will be a bonus question. The answers will appear at the end of the video.
- 2. Discuss vocabulary words used in the video.


#### **Discussion Items and Questions**

- 1. Discuss the following regarding the Cold War:
  - a. What was the Cold War?
  - b. When did the Cold War begin?
  - c. Why did the Cold War begin?
  - d. Which countries were involved in the Cold War?
  - e. What is the relation of the Cold War to World War II?
- 2. Discuss the roles of Presidents Harry S. Truman, Dwight D. Eisenhower, John F. Kennedy and Richard Nixon.
  - a. What did each do prior to their presidency?
  - b. What were their major contributions to the United States?
  - c. What major events occurred regarding the Cold War during each president's tenure?



## **Applications and Activities**

- 1. Create a time line highlighting major events and contributions of each president in this video regarding the Cold War.
- 2. Compare and contrast a map of today to a Cold War-era map. List the differences.
- 3. Explore the following:
  - a. The invention of the atomic bomb
  - b. Why the atomic bomb was built
  - c. The bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki
  - d. The correlation between the atomic bomb and the Cold War



- 5. Outline the details of the following and discuss the importance of each:
  - a. Truman Doctrine
  - b. Eisenhower Doctrine
- 6. Investigate the Berlin Wall.
  - a. When was the Wall built?
  - b. What was the purpose of the Wall?
  - c. How many people died trying to escape from East Berlin to West Berlin?
  - d. Why did these people attempt to escape a communist country?
  - e. When did the Wall come down?
  - f. What was the significance of this event?
- 7. Research and prepare interview questions for one of the following regarding their ideas and feelings during this time.
  - a. Japanese youth involved in the atomic bombing
  - b. Convicted or suspected spies during the Cold War
  - c. Soviet citizen during the Cold War
  - d. American citizen during the Cold War
  - e. Joseph McCarthy
  - f. Soviet leader during the Cold War


