

RESPECTING OTHERS

Grade Levels: 4-8 24 minutes HUMAN RELATIONS MEDIA 1998 3 Instructional Graphics Enclosed

DESCRIPTION

How can one person show respect to others? What happens when there is no respect? Three vignettes illustrate some ways to show respect: being honest and not lying, being courteous by saying "please" and "thank you," showing consideration, and being tolerant of others' opinions. The essence of respect is to treat others the way you want to be treated.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS

- 1. To investigate strong feelings such as anger, sadness, joy and love.
- 2. To practice positive ways to deal with difficult people and situations.
- 3. To emphasize that good character is more important than looks, money, fame, and others.
- 4. To develop healthy judgment skills and problem-solving techniques.
- 5. To recognize the importance of respecting diversity.
- 6. To introduce or review the golden rule.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The link between what a child sees and what a child does is one of the strongest, most influential factors of development. This trend can be damaging in an unstable home, but it also gives educators a vital opportunity. Many students see teachers as much, if not more, than family members. Every moment a teacher shares with students is an invaluable chance to demonstrate the importance of kindness, courtesy, honesty and fairness. Everything that is done in the school environment sends a signal

to students—how sports teams are chosen, how grades are judged, how adults speak to one another. By creating a caring environment that is safe, fair and enjoyable, schools can pick up where so many other segments of society have failed.

This video contains the tools needed to help students recognize and respect the goodness in others. It helps young people practice acts of virtue until these acts become daily habits.

BEFORE SHOWING

- 1. Review the definition of *respect*.
- 2. List ways that people show respect for others.

DURING SHOWING

Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. Stop the video when the narrator suggests taking a break. Make additions or deletions to the list of ways that people show respect for others. Categorize the words used under the three headings: Honest, Courtesy, and Trustworthy.
- 2. Discuss ways to show respect while disagreeing with someone.
- 3. Discuss the "Fish" story. What did Jonas Murray do for a living? What jumped out of the water and spoke to him? Jonas was promised great wealth, but under certain conditions. What were the conditions? What was more important to Jonas than great wealth? What would you have done if you had been Jonas?

AFTER SHOWING

Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. Imagine a world where everyone had the same likes, dislikes, physical characteristics, and opinions. What sort of problems would the world have?
- 2. Discuss bullies. What do they do that doesn't show respect for others? How do you feel when someone bullies you? What do you think a bully feels like on the inside? Do you think people who feel good about themselves would bully others? What do you think are some possible reasons a person becomes a bully?

Applications and Activities

- 1. Discuss the golden rule. What does it mean to "be in someone else's shoes"? Complete the "Different Shoes" activity. (See INSTRUCTIONAL GRAPHICS.)
- 2. List and discuss the characteristics of a true friend. Complete the "Mystery Friend" activity. (See INSTRUCTIONAL GRAPHICS.)
- 3. Complete the activity sheet, "Seeing Straight." (See INSTRUCTIONAL GRAPHICS.) Review your answers and discuss examples of disagreements you have had. Role-play the disagreements and identify the "10 Fair Ways to Disagree" rules that were followed and which were broken.
