CUBA: PINAR DEL RIO

DESCRIPTION

Yudey lives 100 miles from Havana, Cuba, and relates her daily activities in the barrio. Her family is poor and she wants to improve her condition. Discusses her family, food, school, and hopes.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

Subject Area: Geography--Environment and Society

- Standard: Understands how physical systems affect human systems
 - Benchmark: Knows the ways in which human systems develop in response to conditions in the physical environment (e.g., patterns of land use, economic livelihoods, architectural styles of buildings, building materials, flows of traffic, recreation activities)

Subject Area: Geography--Human Systems

- Standard: Understands the nature and complexity of Earth's cultural mosaics
 - Benchmark: Knows the similarities and differences in characteristics of culture in different regions (e.g., in terms of environment and resources, technology, food, shelter, social organization, beliefs and customs, schooling, what girls and boys are allowed to do)

Subject Area: Geography—Places and Regions

- Standard: Understands the physical and human characteristics of place
 - Benchmark: Knows the human characteristics of places (e.g., cultural characteristics such as religion, language, politics, technology, family structure, gender; population characteristics; land uses; levels of development)

INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS

- 1. To introduce the country, geography, and people of Cuba.
- 2. To dramatize the life of a 13-year-old girl who lives in Pinar del Rio, a city at the western end of Cuba.
- 3. To follow the process of how Cuban cigars are made.
- 4. To explore the history of relations between Cuba and the United States.

BEFORE SHOWING

1. Write the name "Yudelkis Prieto Pérez" and "Pinar del Río," the name of her town on the board. Point out her city on a map.



- 2. Yudey comes from a very poor family. Why do you think poor people are poor?
- 3. Do you what rationing is? Ask your grandparents about ration cards during World War II.
- 4. Where does sugar come from? How does it grow and how is it processed?

AFTER SHOWING

- 1. Did anything about the profile of Yudey surprise or shock you? Did she say something that caught your attention?
- 2. Are there comments on the school that Yudey attends? Or the classroom and her studies of geography of Cuba?
- 3. Most people never think of sawdust as a cooking fuel. Do you have any impressions on seeing Yudey's father prepare the fire?
- 4. Yudey's father works at a home factory, producing tomato paste, which is later sold in the market. Would you buy his product?
- 5. Are there any comments on the house where Yudey lives? On her parents?
- 6. One of Cuba's main industries involves the making and export of cigars. What is your view of tobacco, cigarettes and cigars?
- 7. If the United States government permitted it citizens to travel to Cuba, would you be interested in touring the country?
- 8. Do you know who José Marti is and the place of honor he holds with Cubans? Do you know who Ernesto "Che" Guevara is?
- 9. What do you know of the United States embargo against Cuba? What is an *embargo*? Are you in favor of, or against, the embargo?

SUMMARY

Yudelkis Prieto Pérez, Yudey to her friends, is a 14-year old girl who lives with her parents and younger brother in a poor barrio in Pinar del Río, a city at the western end of Cuba. With her friend, she heads off to school where she is in the 9th grade. We view her with her classmates in a geography class.

Then later on we enter one of the recently permitted home factories where her father works making tomato paste. Her mother works around the house. Yudey helps prepare the supper meal. She and her father prepare the cooking fire. The video also visits a tobacco farm and follows the process of how Cuban cigars are made. Finally, we follow Yudey as she goes to classes in mathematics on a Saturday and plays with other children before returning home.
