### LOVE--ALL THAT & MORE: PART 1: WHAT DO YOU WANT?

CENTER FOR PREVENTION OF SEXUAL/DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, 2000 Grade Levels: 9-12 22 minutes

#### DESCRIPTION

What do young people want in dating relationships? Teens voice their feelings, confusions, and experiences with dating. Men and women both acknowledge media's influence on their expectations, while noting they all want equality and mutual respect.

#### ACADEMIC STANDARDS

#### Subject Area: Health

- ★ Standard: Understands the relationship of family health to individual health
  - Benchmark: Understands the responsibilities inherent in dating relationships, marriage, and parenthood. (See Instructional Goal #3.)
- ★ Standard: Understands the fundamental concepts of growth and development
  - Benchmark: Understands how physical, mental, social, and cultural factors influence attitudes and behaviors regarding sexuality. (See Instructional Goal #1.)

#### **INSTRUCTIONAL GOALS**

- 1. To increase awareness of gender stereotypes portrayed in the media and how these images promote unrealistic standards and expectations for men and women.
- 2. To examine the connection between unequal power and abuse in dating relationships.
- 3. To illustrate the elements that make up healthy relationships.
- 4. To encourage seeking relationships based on equality and mutual respect.

#### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

While this video and activities should not be upsetting, they could potentially elicit painful feelings for someone who has experienced abuse in a dating or family relationship. If you are concerned that one of your participants has witnessed or experienced abuse, or a disclosure of abuse is made during the session, avoid singling out this person in the group or discussing the abuse while others are present. Review your state's child abuse reporting guidelines before initiating any discussion about abuse with the student.

#### **BEFORE SHOWING**

- 1. Create a list of ground rules for respectful behavior during the video, discussion, and activities. Consider the following.
  - a. The right for people to speak without being interrupted.
  - b. Not making fun of what someone else says.
  - c. Attending quietly during the video and discussion.
- 2. List five things that you are looking for in a boyfriend/girlfriend.

#### **AFTER SHOWING**

#### Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. What does the media say about how men and women are supposed to look and act?
- 2. What do boys do to try to make themselves tougher, stronger, or in control of a situation?
- 3. What do boys have to give up or hide about themselves in order to live up to the stereotype of a "real man"?
- 4. What was going on at the school in the vignette, "What They Gave for Love"? What did the blonde girl say she used to have to give up to get a date? What do girls give up in real life?
- 5. Discuss foot binding of girls in China?
- 6. What do girls hide about themselves in order to be more attractive?
- 7. How do the unwritten rules for men and women get in the way of healthy relationships?
- 8. What did the teens in the video say they were looking for in a dating partner?

#### Applications and Activities

- 1. Revise the list of qualities you are looking for in a boyfriend/girlfriend. (See Before Showing #2.)
- 2. Create a list of rules for healthy dating relationships.
- 3. Imagine interviewing someone before going out or getting intimately involved. Write 10 open-ended questions that will provide the information needed to make a good choice.
