



# PICTURE THIS AMERICA: REMEMBERING THOSE WHO SERVED

## **DESCRIPTION**

John and Jan Goldsmith narrate this tribute about Memorial Day. Features gifts left at the Vietnam Memorial (The Wall), their storage, and treatment; the United States Marine Corps War Memorial (better known as the Iwo Jima Memorial) with comments from its sculptor; civil war reenactments; a short history of women in war and military service; reminiscences about the luncheon meat spam in World War II; and a brief look at dogs in war.

# **BEFORE SHOWING**

- 1. Brainstorm ideas about the American armed services using a chart with three columns: name of war, memorial location, and branch of the service honored.
- 2. Discuss the purpose for the Memorial Day and Veterans Day holidays. How they are celebrated?

## **AFTER SHOWING**

## **▶** Discussion Items and Questions

- 1. What happens to the thousands of tributes left daily at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial? What kinds of objects are left? How do these objects write history from the bottom up?
- 2. What does the United States Marine Corps War Memorial immortalize? Who were the men in Joe Rosenthal's photo? How did Felix de Weldon create this sculpture? What is the size of the sculpture?
- 3. Why is there no combat footage of the Civil War? What is the purpose of the reenactments? How do participants prepare to participate in reenactments? How authentic are the reenactments?
- 4. Why did it take so long to establish the Women in Military Service of America Memorial? In what capacities have women served in the military? Why have they not been recognized as veterans?
- 5. How is SPAM luncheon meat related to war? Why do veterans have strong feelings related to SPAM? How popular is SPAM?
- 6. What roles have dogs played in the military? What memorials honor these canine combatants?

## ► Applications and Activities

- 1. Complete the chart begun in Before Showing #1. Use information from the video and also further research. Include national, state, and local memorials.
- 2. Plan a trip to visit the United States war memorials in Washington D.C. Consider visiting the memorials discussed in the video. Investigate other memorials in Washington D.C., Virginia, and Maryland.





