

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HEMINGWAY: A PORTRAIT

Docudrama explores some events that shaped the life and writing of Ernest Hemingway. Touches on his boyhood, the influences of World War I, the running of the bulls in Pamplona, Spain, and his time in Cuba and Key West. Reveals something of his passion for life and curiosity about death.

- ★ Standard: Understands the search for peace and stability throughout the world in the 1920s and 1930s
 - Benchmark: Understands how the emergence of new art, literature, music, and scientific theories influenced society in the early 20th century (e.g., the impact of innovative movements in art, architecture, and literature, such as Cubism, Surrealism, Expressionism, Socialist Realism, and jazz; reflections of war in such movements as Dadaism, and the literary works of Remarque, Spender, Brooke, and Hemingway; the major themes of writers of the "Lost Generation" in the post-World War I era; prominent musicians and composers of the first half of the century and the cultural impact of their music around the world; how Freud's psychoanalytic method and theories of the unconscious changed views of human motives and human nature) (See Instructional Goal #1.)
- ★ Standard: Understands the causes and global consequences of World War II
 - Benchmark: Understands the exceptional violence of the Spanish Civil War (e.g., as described in works by George Orwell and Ernest Hemingway) and understands how foreign intervention affected the outcome of this war (See Instructional Goal #1.)

- 1. To depict Hemingway's life and writing in the historical backdrop of the 1920s, 1930s, and World War II.
- 2. To introduce major events in Hemingway's life and his writing.

- 2. Review the major world events from 1920-1949. Consider how these events may have impacted Hemingway as a person and a writer.

- 1. What does this video reveal about Hemingway's passion for living and curiosity about death? How does his life fit the themes of endurance and one-on-one confrontations?
- 2. What are some of Hemingway's better known works?
- 3. What did Hemingway win the Nobel Prize for? What does his acceptance say about him as a person and a writer?
- 4. What impact did the following time periods and events have on Hemingway as a person and a writer?
 - a. his boyhood in the Michigan forests
 - b. his attempts to save a dying comrade on a World War I battlefield in Italy
 - c. the Running of the Bulls in Pamplona, Spain
 - d. his Key West beachside home
- 5. Why did Hemingway consider *The Old Man and the Sea* to be his greatest work? What was his personal fascination with the sea?

Applications and Activities

- 1. Evaluate the producer's decision to create a docudrama rather than a traditional documentary of Hemingway's life.
 - a. How did this medium try to identify moments of truth that had a significant impact on Hemingway's life and writing?
 - b. How did the minimum dialogue allow viewers to make their own judgments?
 - c. How might this format allow you to better understand Hemingway's life and work?

- 2. Research further about Hemingway's life. Write an in-depth biography expanding on events and places touched on in the video. Consider influential people in his life.
- 3. Complete the Hemingway Crossword Puzzle. (See Instructional Graphics.)


