Molly's Pilgrim Study Guide

Learning Objectives:

- To teach children that tolerance of people from different backgrounds is a fundamental American value, as fundamental as Thanksgiving
- To link the plight of Russian Jews to the plight of the Pilgrims, showing that both groups came to America for religious freedom
- To show that friendship is based on appreciation of personal differences as well as similarities

Activities and Discussions:

- 1. Read the book by Barbara Cohen.
- 2. Have you ever had someone like Molly in your class? Would you like to?
- 3. How did Molly's doll help tell the story of Thanksgiving? If you were Molly, would you bring such a doll to class even though it is different?
- 4. If you were Molly's classmates, how would you act towards her? Would you be friendly just to be nice, or would you really try to get to know her?
- 5. If you were Molly's teacher, would you have acted like she did when Molly brought the doll to class?
- 6. If you made a doll based on a Pilgrim what would it be? Why?
- 7. Research the plight of the Russian Jewish immigrants. Write about your findings. Share your findings with friends and family.
- 8. Explain or write a paragraph on how and why you think each of the following events are different in the story's book and video version:
- Molly's classmates' behavior toward her
- Molly's experience in school
- The classmates' reaction toward Molly's pilgrim
- The teacher's explanation of Thanksgiving to the class
